







This week the UK commemorated Holocaust Memorial Day. This year, the theme is "Stand Together" so, in the wake of Harry and Meghan's decision to step down as royals, our KS2 pupils were looking deeper into our society to decide whether our society is tolerant. Discussion points included: examples of diversity and inclusion we see in our community; articles or programmes we've seen that might show intolerance (maybe towards a person or an idea); thoughts on what is happening in the Royal Family; different awareness days that we focus upon. Although not all classes took part in the vote this week, of those that did, just 49% felt that the UK is truly a tolerant place to live, with many recognising that there is still a lot more we can do to live together in peace and harmony.

In KS1 we were looking at information about different countries – UK, USA, Canada and Australia - to help Harry and Meghan decide where to move to! When asked 'If you could live anywhere, would you choose UK,' we had another very split vote with 48% choosing Yes, the remainder perhaps enticed by examples of different foods, animals and weather in other countries.

Desserts this week include ice cream roll, fruit sponge, ginger and carrot cake, shortbread biscuit, ice cream, yoghurt and fresh fruit.


School Dinners

World Book Day - Thursday 5th March


